From the Desk of Fr. Francis

Greetings of Christ's Peace and Joy! Hope you all had a blessed week.



Advent and Liturgical Year

Today is the First Sunday of Advent, the first day of the liturgical year B. You probably have already noticed the change of the color of the Altar Linens and the devotional ritual to the Advent Wreath. For the next four weeks, we will particularly walk with John the Baptist and Mary, to prepare our hearts and minds for the celebration of the birth of our Savior.

As we begin this new liturgical year in the midst of the global pandemic, our sense of time has been heightened and I think it is good for us to review on our liturgical year, a seasonal cycle of celebrating Jesus' birth, death and resurrection. The Second Vatican Council's <u>Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy</u> summarizes the profound meaning of the liturgical celebrations of the Church and their organization as follows:

Holy Church celebrates the saving work of Christ on prescribed days in the course of the year with sacred remembrance. Each week, on the day called the Lord's Day, she commemorates the Resurrection of the Lord, which she also celebrates once a year in the great Paschal Solemnity, together with his blessed Passion. In fact, throughout the course of the year the Church unfolds the entire mystery of Christ and observes the birthdays of the Saints. (no. 1)

The liturgical year is made up of six seasons:

- *Advent four weeks of preparation before the celebration of Jesus' birth
- *<u>Christmas</u> recalling the Nativity of Jesus Christ and his manifestation to the peoples of the world
- *Lent a six-week period of penance before Easter
- *<u>Sacred Paschal Triduum</u> the holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where the Christian people recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus
- *<u>Easter</u> 50 days of joyful celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead and his sending forth of the Holy Spirit

*<u>Ordinary Time</u> - divided into two sections (one span of 4-8 weeks after Christmas Time and another lasting about six months after Easter Time), wherein the faithful consider the fullness of Jesus' teachings and works among his people

Throughout the liturgical year, we celebrate the different dimensions of the life of Jesus and these celebrations help us to be mindful of our salvation history. Our Sunday readings are divided into Years A, B, and C and our weekday readings are consisted of years I and II. All the readings are arranged seasonally to help us to commemorate the saving work of Christ.

As we begin this new liturgical year with the season of Advent, a time to prepare and to wait, let's pray for God's grace to renew, to heal, and to purify us.



Advent Wreath

An Advent wreath symbolizes our longing for the coming of Christ. The wreath is a circle of evergreen branches into which are set four candles. Traditionally three candles are violet, and one is rose, but four violet or four white candles may also be used.

The wreath symbolizes many things. Evergreens signify God's enduring promise of redemption, evident like green branches in the midst of snow. The circle signifies our hope for the return of Christ, whose Kingdom will have no end. The colors of the candles match the traditional colors of the vesture for the four Sundays of Advent.

Violet garments signify our penitent hope for salvation. The rose color, which may be worn on Advent's Third Sunday, signals that the season is nearly over—joy is at hand!

The wreath's most luminous symbol is its growing light. One candle is lit on the First Sunday of Advent, two on the Second, three on the Third and all four on the Fourth. In the northern hemisphere, Advent comes at a time when the days decrease to their shortest length. As the hours of darkness increase, we light more candles on the wreath. The wreath, which symbolizes the coming of Christ, grows in intensity as the anniversary of Jesus' birth draws near.

The Advent wreath may be used at home or at church. It should be blessed on the First Sunday of Advent after the homily at one Mass, at evening prayer Saturday night, or during a prayer service including biblical readings and Advent songs. At home, a family member can bless the wreath. It may be lit during the evening meal, to remind everyone of the true meaning of this holy season.

Advent Wreath Year B

If you are setting up an Advent wreath in your home this year, here are some prayers you could say while you light its candles. You may say these before or after a meal, when waking up, before going to bed, or whenever you and the members of your household can gather for prayer. Before you say the prayer, read and talk over the gospel you heard at Sunday Mass that week.

Week 1: O God, who ask us to be watchful and alert because we do not know when you will come, let this candle give us light and help us stay awake. At those times when you ask us to act, give us strength to respond at once. Through Christ our Lord.

Week 2: O God, who sent John the Baptist to proclaim a Baptism of repentance, let these two candles prepare the way for the Lord within us. Forgive our sins and fill us with your Holy Spirit. Make us ready to celebrate the birthday of our Savior. Through Christ our Lord.

Week 3: O God, who sent John the Baptist as a voice crying out in the desert, open our ears to hear his message as we light the rose candle. Shape our lives so that they will become a straight path to you. Make us ready to greet your Son when he comes to us. Through Christ our Lord.

Week 4: O God, who sent your angel Gabriel to announce good news to Mary, make us happy with your word of life. Let our hearts be so filled with love for you that they glow with the light of these four candles. May we live in a | way that will please you. Through Christ our Lord.

Father Li came to pray with our students and offer a blessing for Thanksgiving.




