Being Attentive During this Advent

One of the central messages of Advent is about watching and being prepared. It calls us to consciously take some quality time daily to be attentive to our spiritual lives, to see if there are things that we need to make changes, and to be aware of God working in and through us.

We all know how busy our lives can be during this holiday season. With the challenge of the COVID - 19, this year is particularly hard. We are being distracted by many obligations, responsibilities, and hardships.

The necessity of doing self-examination as a practice of being attentive has been taught by many sages in our history. For example, Confucius taught his students to do self-examination three times a day. Tseng **Tzu** said: "I daily examine myself on three points: —whether, in transacting business for others, I may have been not faithful; —whether, in intercourse with friends, I may have been not sincere; —whether I may have not mastered and practiced the instructions of my teacher."

In the Jesuit tradition, Ignatius taught his brothers to practice **The Daily Examen** which is "a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to detect God's presence and discern his direction for us. The Examen is an ancient practice in the Church that can help us see God's hand at work in our whole experience."

We have so many examples of heroes and heroines in faith who can be our guides and teachers for being attentive to God in our daily discipleship. As we celebrate the Feast of St. Barbara this Sunday, we are reminded how St. Barbara has been a source of inspiration for countless of our parishioners throughout the over 100 years of history. Being a convert, St. Barbara was always attentive to God and was always willing to learn more about the Trinity. The transformations which took place in her life are manifestations of her attentiveness to God's grace, God's love, and God' mercy. What an example we have in St. Barbara.

So this Advent, let's strive to be attentive to God, and we do so by being attentive first to one another.

THE THREE MEANINGS OF ADVENT

The roots of the English word ADVENT are found in two Latin words. The verb, VENIRE, which means to come and the preposition AD, which means toward. The four weeks of advent focus on the coming of God to us. Advent has three meanings.

There is the coming of God in the person of Jesus of Nazareth who entered into time and history born into human flesh in Bethlehem of Judea. This coming is celebrated and remembered annually at Christmas. Advent prepares us for the coming of Christ at His birth.

There is the coming of God at the end of time to judge the living and the dead. God will appear as Lord in majesty on the last day. Advent looks to the final times, which some refer to as the Rapture, and it prepares us for when the Lord will come and usher in the fullness of God's Reign and the end of this world.

There is the coming of God in the present moment, when we may least expect it---the advent of God into my own life. Some refer to this as God's coming in mystery. God's nearness can be experienced in a variety of ways, in persons, events, in the Sacraments and in prayer.

In the past God came in the historical coming of Jesus Christ to save us. In God's hands is the future God will come again. And, in the now of everyday God comes to us. Advent invites us to be ready, alert and prepared for these many comings of God to us.

Thus, while Advent is structured around these comings of God to us, now is also the time for us to come to God. Advent is like a two way street--- God to us and us to God. Have we begun our Advent journey yet?

SAINT AND MARTYR: PATRON SAINT FOR MINERS, FIREFIGHTERS, and ARTILLERY. (She's venerated by Catholics who face the danger of sudden and violent death)

St. Barbara known in the Eastern Orthodox Church as the Great Martyr Barbara, lived and suffered during the reign of the emperor Maximian (305-311). Because of doubts about the historicity of her legend, she was removed from the General

Roman Calendar in the 1969 revision, though not from the Catholic Church's list of saints.

Barbara was the daughter of the rich pagan named Dioscorus and when his wife died, Dioscorus put all his attention on his only daughter. Barbara was extraordinarily beautiful so Dioscorus decided to hide her from the eyes of strangers. Her father built her a tower where only her pagan teachers were allowed to see her. From her tower, Barbara was able to view the wooded hills, rivers and meadows blanketed with flowers, which was breathtaking. She came to a realization that idols could not have made the surrounding world. Her father and teachers offered worship to these idols, but Barbara's desire to know the true God, consumed her soul so she decided to devote all her life to this goal and to spend her life in virginity.

Before Dioscorus set off on a journey, he ordered a bath-house to be erected for Barbara's use near her tower. Originally, two windows were to be put in, but Barbara had three windows put in as a symbol of the Holy Trinity. When her father returned, Barbara acknowledged herself as a Christian, which infuriated her father.

The short end of her story, was that her father, being so angry at his daughter for not renouncing her Christian faith, took out his sword and beheaded her. However, as punishment, on his way home, he was struck by lightning and his body was consumed by flames. Barbara was buried by a Christian, Valentinus, and her tomb became the site of miracles.

St. Barbara Symbols:

<u>The Tower:</u> is a reference to the Holy Trinity and this symbol is frequently associated with military engineering emblems.

<u>The Cannon:</u> a modern symbol referenced to her role as patron of artillerymen.

<u>The Peacock Feather</u>: a traditional Christian symbol of immortality due to the belief that peacock flesh does not decay. The peacock feather is frequently associated with St. Barbara in reference to her home city of Heliopolis.

<u>The Crown:</u> an early Christian symbol of immortality and martyrdom, in reference to the crown of thorns worn by Jesus Christ during his crucifixion.

<u>The Chalice</u>: symbol of the Sacrament, which is often associated with St. Barbara because of her final wish for the grace of Sacrament. St. Barbara is the only female saint to be depicted with the communion chalice and wafer.

Dear Parishioners.

The time has come for me to retire from my post as your Music/Choir Director as of December 31st. I have developed deep and lasting friendships with many of you and I am thankful to God for allowing me to serve St. Barbara for nearly 30 years. I arrived here first in 1990 as a pianist/organist accompanist and then became Music Director and Music Teacher for both, the church and the school in 1996. I left for another Director position in 2001 but came back to St. Barbara in 2006 till present time. I've considered how I'd like to spend my final working years as a church musician and playing as a sub-organist is what I'll be doing, so you will still see me at the organ for the 6:00 a.m. mass and most 9:30 a.m. masses. I will miss working with the choirs and cantors, and I will personally be thanking all of them including the staff.
